Hoping that once again someone will see this if you are able to put it on the web. It is prompted by James G. Leyburn's "The Scotch Irish" 1962 U. of NC Press, and by the following names and dates of my family's history.

1. **Clement Skolfield Wilson, M.D.**, Brunswick and Harpswell, ME 1905-1948
2. **Emery Graves Wilson, Atty.**, Harpswell and Portland, ME 1874-1938
3. **Capt. John Wilson**, Harpswell, ME 1835-1884
4. **David Wilson**, Harpswell, ME 1793-1840
5. **Deacon James Wilson**, Harpswell, ME 1747-1838
6. **Alexander Wilson, Harpswell** 1718-1774 m. Catherine Swanzey 1727-1764
7. **James Wilson or Willson**, Topsham, ME 1671-1743 m. in 1704 Jean. Came in 1719 in a party of 500 Scotch-Irish, led by a Robert Temple (recognized by SAGS as an entrepreneur, finding people and ships for New World relocation), landing at Bath, ME (then called Long Reach), thence moving to Topsham, ME (about 8 miles away) where land was available from the agents of the Pejepscot Proprietors. This voyage supposedly started from Londonderry, Ireland. James and Jean came with four of their later to be six children: Jennet 1706-1778, William 1710- , Robert 1714- , Alexander 1718-1774. The two Maine born children were Samuel 1722- , and Hugh 1729-1777, whose house (a poor man's cape with two horse barn and outhouse) is still standing at 18 Winter Street, Topsham.
